Information & Media Literacy: Interdisciplinary Perspectives on Education and Digitalization in a Mediatized Information and Knowledge Society

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Abstract

Social innovation in makerspaces as a means for media literacy? – Exemplary tools and projects for children between 6 and 16 as preparation to create a better world (presentation + workshop)

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Current media literacy projects include digital tools as a means to understand and critically assess media development in the field of IT-based communication and applications. Coding with kids or using digital tools such as 3D printers or vinyl cutters or educational tools like the LEGO Mindstorms or the Makey Makey Kit are not only used to build STEM interests and digital literacy, but also to empower critical reflection. Within the European initiative "DOIT- Entrepreneurial skills for young social innovators in an open digital world" (2017-2020), which is co-financed by the European Union within the Horizon 2020 programme, children and youth between 6 to 16 years are the addressed target group (Schön & Hollauf, 2017; Schön, Jagrikova & Voigt, 2018). Whereas the project not directly addresses media literacy as a core result – it aims to develop future social innovator and foster entrepreneurial thinking - the project consortium builds upon partners who are also already widening media literacy education approaches to coding and making. The contribution will present the DOIT approach of social innovation in makerspace settings with concrete projects, e.g. the friendly garbage bin (says "thank you") which can be directly be used and modified by the audience, followed by a final feed-back round.
